Reva bathed her, dressed her, made matching bracelets, placed an order for a Poppy Plate, and was so adamant about singing happy birthday. And that's just what we did.

The fact that we got to do all of these things with our sweet baby girl, whose home was in heaven

long before we could hold her, is something I still believe to this day was a key component in the healing

process. God gave us Reva. Reva gave us healing. Reva loved on our sweet baby Charlotte with complete

absence of discomfort and treated this birth as any other. My wife and I both are truly grateful and thankful

for Reva more than words can describe. But as life would have it, this would not be the last time we receive

above and beyond exceptional care from Reva.

Fast forward to August 10th, 2023, we now have 3 healthy babies at home and a 4th on the way. The

day was an exciting one, as my wife would have her 12-week ultrasound and as a Dad I was excited, as it was

a boy and the boy to girl ratio would be even! 3 to 3! On the ultrasound screen, there he was! The tie

breaker. Only there was a familiar feeling looming in the air as though deja-vu was setting in. There was no

heartbeat. The emotional crash from almost 2 years ago was flooding back. Our doctor scheduled a D&C for

the following morning at UAMS. A couple hours after being admitted, you guessed it, Reva Martin, the floor

nurse from almost two years ago, was at our door. Reva, for a second time in our lives, made herself 100

percent available for our, yet again, grieving family.

Reva helped us grow and heal through acceptance, encouraging us to make the most of nothing.

Reva even gave us peace by showing continued love, care, and support throughout the entire hospital stay

both times. She went to our lowest points with us as though she was made to do that very thing. One with

such diligence to her job, patient advocacy, and selflessness should never go unnoticed. That is why we have
