
THE EARLY YEARS

As a young man, John E. Harmon, Sr. spent much of his time at Mercer County Community College (MCCC), a popular place to socialize, play basketball, and shoot pool. His path changed when three women who worked at the college noticed him and urged him to enroll, even guiding him through the application process. At that point, Harmon was working as a mechanic, and while his parents and six siblings had never earned college degrees, he became the first in his family to pursue higher education. His father, a truck driver who deeply valued his son's achievements despite not completing high school himself, proudly attended both his MCCC and Fairleigh Dickinson University (FDU) graduations.

After completing his studies at MCCC, Harmon transferred to FDU's Rutherford Campus to pursue a degree in business management. There, he embraced leadership roles as president of the Black Student Union and as a resident assistant. His time at FDU opened new doors, giving him the chance to grow academically, socially, and personally.

Looking back, Harmon reflects on this chapter as a turning point. As he put it, he was "a young Black man from Trenton finally realizing that a better life could be had with a college education." With encouragement, mentorship, and determination, he laid the groundwork for the successful career and community leadership that would follow.





Harmon: The Early Years


1960

John E. Harmon Sr., was born to
Vivian & Adair Harmon, on
September 15, 1960, Trenton, NJ.
The family lived in a rowhouse on Sanford
Street, in a working-class neighborhood
(the North Ward).

1969

John was one of seven children, Eddie, Kenny, Nate, Dwight, Paulette & Arlene. At the age of 9, John's mom signed him up for the Little League Team, he played until 1972. 1972

The family moved to a middle class neighborhood of West Trenton, into a three story semi detached six bedroom house. John continued to play baseball for the West End Little League 72-75 (Babe Ruth League).



John started high school - tenth grade, Trenton Central High School -Vocational School, he attended a exploratory program for all the trades. John enrolled in Auto Mechanics Program for the three years. John graduates from High School, in 1978. That year, he suffers the tragic loss of his beloved mother, Vivian at the age of 17. John's mother was 53 years young.







1979

John pursues his love of mechanics, working with Haldeman Ford and Firestone. He later enrolled at MCCC in 1979. He graduated from MCCC in 1981, and graduated Fairleigh Dickinson University in 1983.


John began his banking career at Chemical Bank. He later worked at the Bowery Savings Bank and United Bank of Philadelphia. (1983 - 1993)

1986


John marries Lennice Harmon in 1986. John and Lennice had three sons together, John Jr. (1983), Joshua (1988) and Justin (1989).

John started Harmon Transfer, Trucking Company, in 1989. In 1992, John left his banking positions and focused full time on his trucking business. (1989 -2005).




John's father, Adair, dies at the age of 63 in July of 1996. John's beloved sister Paulette dies from Cancer in August of 1996 at 37 years of age.

JOHN E. HARMON, SR., BS'83 (RUTH), BUSINESS MANAGEMENT

As a young man, John E. Harmon, Sr., spent time on the campus of Mercer County Community College (MCCC) — a kind of social gathering spot and a great place to play basketball or shoot pool.

One day, three women who worked for the college challenged him. "They called me by name and said, 'John Harmon, you're here every day. Why don't you go to school? You should be in school here," he recalls. "They helped me with the paperwork, and I enrolled."

At the time, Harmon worked as a mechanic. His father was a truck driver and his mother, who had worked in a factory, had passed away. None of his six siblings had completed a college degree. "My father didn't go to college or finish high school, but he really appreciated my accomplishments. He came to my community college graduation and my FDU graduation." Harmon attended FDU's Rutherford Campus after MCCC and studied business management. He was president of the Black Student Union and a resident assistant.

"I was a young Black man from Trenton finally realizing that a better life could be had with a college education," he says. Through grants and the Educational Opportunity Fund (EOF), Harmon found both the financial and personal support he needed to succeed in college. And career services connected Harmon with the Bowery Savings Bank for a management-training program, putting him on track to flourish in the business world. He was the only Black man selected for the program.

"I got a chance at a young age to work with some very smart people who allowed me to evolve, to learn from my mistakes, and they didn't chastise me, but rather encouraged me," says Harmon.He left the banking industry after a decade to start his own trucking business, Harmon Transfer Corp., which he ran for 16 years.

"Fairleigh Dickinson University was an integral part of my success," Harmon says. "College opened up pathways and taught me to engage in conversation in a substantive way." He's also proud to say that all three of his sons have attended college. In 1997, he became involved with the Metropolitan Trenton African American Chamber of Commerce (MTAACC) and then in 2007, he founded the African American Chamber of Commerce of New Jersey (AACCNJ). He has served as president and CEO ever since.


His mission at the AACCNJ is to pay it forward and to create more equitable opportunities for Black-owned businesses and Black entrepreneurs.

"It's about being impactful in someone else's life the way that others were impactful in mine." At Commencement 2022, in May, Harmon received an honorary degree from FDU, and delivered the graduation address. He said, "FDU has prepared you to confront tomorrow's challenges head-on and to unearth future opportunities, therefore, take full advantage of this mutual investment in your future by making us all proud that we had this time together today." Later in June, Harmon became a member of FDU's Board of Trustees.





A HISTORY OF TRENTON NJ



Yet even as the streets carried this air of rootedness, the seeds of change were being planted. Across the country, suburbanization was drawing families out of cities, and Trenton was no exception. Middle-class families, both white and Black, began to leave for new housing developments outside the city limits. Real estate agents played a role, stoking fears about changing racial demographics in order to encourage rapid turnover in certain blocks. Meanwhile, the city itself was reshaping the landscape through urban renewal projects, building highways and large government complexes that disrupted old patterns of neighborhood life. The effects were subtle at first, but the signs of dislocation and disinvestment were there.





As the decade unfolded, North Trenton became a place where demographic shifts were visible on every street. More Black families, many newly arrived from the South, moved into the neighborhood, building their own professional and working-class presence. At the same time, some of the older white immigrant groups and religious communities began moving away. Commercial corridors that had once thrived slowly thinned out, as small shops struggled against both suburban shopping centers and the shrinking customer base left in the city. For longtime residents, there was growing awareness that neighborhood's rhythm was changing, even if daily life still held its old patterns of school, church, and cornerstore errands.

The breaking point came with the riots of 1968, following the assassination of Martin Luther King Jr. Trenton erupted unrest. and North Trentonparticularly around the **Battle** Monument—felt the impact. Businesses were damaged or closed, many never reopened. residents, the riots marked a symbolic and material shift, accelerating the departure of families and deepening the challenges that urban renewal and disinvestment had already begun. What had been. in 1960. neighborhood of stability and pride was by the decade's end a community grappling with loss, uncertainty, and the heavy imprint of broader social forces that reshaped cities across America.









JOHN E. HARMON SR., IOM FOUNDER, PRESIDENT, CEO, AACCNJ

In 1997, as a small businessperson, John E. Harmon, Sr. was an early member of the Metropolitan Trenton African American Chamber of Commerce (MTAACC), becoming its president, two years later. Under his guidance, MTAACC grew its membership, forged alliances with business associations/organizations and government, and forged strategic partnerships in the public and private sectors to benefit African American businesses throughout New Jersey. Harmon recognized the growing need for a statewide organization that could align both government and business interests to advocate for New Jersey's Black entrepreneurs and their communities. That led him to establish the AACCNJ – which is heralded as the leading voice for business development and economic empowerment for New Jersey's Black owned businesses.

Harmon has served as the Founder, President, and CEO of the African American Chamber of Commerce of New Jersey (AACCNJ), since 2007. In this role he has the responsibility of establishing, implementing, and executing the mission, as well as the fiduciary oversight and governance of AACCNJ in accordance with its Bylaws. In addition, he works to identify strategic partnerships in both the public and private sector to connect AACCNJ members and supporters to resources and opportunities to grow and sustain their goals and objectives. Moreover, Harmon serves as an advocate on behalf of the 1.2 million African American residents and the over 88,000 Black owned businesses statewide to ensure that policy at the municipal, county, and federal level provides fairness, equity and access to a level playing field in the marketplace. Harmon hosts the Gold Telly Award winning - AACCNJ monthly television show "Pathway to Success" as well as the Chamber's weekly radio show "The Empowerment Hour."

Prior to his twenty-seven-year career as a chamber executive, Mr. Harmon was previously employed at The Bowery Savings Bank (now part of Capital One Bank) in New York City where he managed the bank's Residential Real Estate Department overlooking major mortgage loan transactions; and at Chemical Bank where he managed third party loan originations for New York, New Jersey, and Connecticut. While working at Chemical Bank, Mr. Harmon established The Affordable Housing Loan Program. Following his banking career, Mr. Harmon founded a transportation company in 1989, called Harmon Transfer, Corp. The company transported dry goods, perishable commodities, and produce throughout the Northeast United States and Canada.

Harmon is the Former Chairman of the Board for the National Black Chamber of Commerce; there are 150 Affiliate Chapters of the NBCC and over fifteen international affiliates. Harmon is a member of the US Chamber of Commerce – Board of Directors, the Federal Reserve Bank of Philadelphia's Economic Community Advisory Council (ECAC), Hackensack Meridian Health Board of Directors, Jersey Central Power & Digital Place Based Advertising Association and is a member of the US Chamber of Commerce Committee of 100. He is the Founder CEO & Digital Place Based Advertising Association and is a member of the US Chamber of Commerce Committee of 100. He is the Founder CEO & Digital Place Black Business Alliance, Inc. (NYSBBA), and was pinned as a new member of the 100 Black Men of NY in January of 2025. Additionally, Mr. Harmon is a Board member of the New Jersey Chamber of Commerce (NJCC), New Jersey BPU, Supplier Diversity Development Council (SDDC), Opportunity New Jersey, Better Choices, Better Care NJ, Chairman of Crime Stoppers of Greater Trenton. He is a former Board Member of Fairleigh Dickinson University, Investors Bank, American Chamber of Commerce Executives (ACCE), First Book, and Minding Our Business (MOB), a youth entrepreneurial initiative in affiliation with Rider University.





Harmon was awarded in 2024 with the National Association of Corporate Directors Awards – non- profit governance award. NJ Biz Power 100 List for 2024, 2023, 2022 and in 2018 to its Power 10 list. Harmon was acknowledged in 2021 and 2022 by ROI-NJ, for two consecutive years as the Number 1 Person of Color in NJ and was recognized in ROI-NJ "People of Color Influencers" for 2023 and 2018.

Harmon was recognized as one of the NJ Business Hall of Fame Class of 2021 Laureates on December 9 th, 2021. In 2021, for the third consecutive year, Harmon was acknowledged in South Jersey Journal's list of the "Twenty-five Most Influential African Americans in New Jersey. Harmon was honored by NJBIA as the Executive of the Year in October of 2022, and the New Jersey Symphony Orchestra at their Spring Gala in May of 2022. Harmon is also recognized as a Center of Influence (COI) for the

United States Army and was selected as a participant in the Joint Civilian Orientation 2018 Conference (JCOC) hosted by the Secretary of Defense. The JCOC program is the oldest and most prestigious public liaison program in the Department of Defense. Harmon was selected as one of 40 individuals (out of 230 applicants) to attend JCOC 18. In addition, Harmon was the only attendee from the State of New Jersey to participate in the conference. Harmon was the first individual selected as a member of the host committee for NFL Super Bowl XLVII held in NJ in 2014.

John E. Harmon, Sr., IOM, ABA, BA, ABA, h.c., BS, L.H.D. h.c. holds an associate degree in Business Administration from Mercer County Community College and holds a Bachelor of Arts degree in Business Management, Fairleigh Dickinson University, 1983. Shortly before graduating in 1983, Harmon received a call from FDU's career development office encouraging him to apply for a management training program for future bank presidents. Of 150 candidates, he was one of only 12 chosen – and the only African American. Mr. Harmon also successfully completed a one-year Fellowship on Regionalism and Sustainability sponsored by The Ford Foundation and completed the Minority Business Management Seminar at the University of Wisconsin-Madison, in 2009. Additionally, Mr. Harmon completed a four- year Chamber Executive Management Program, at Villanova University, sponsored by the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, in 2014. Harmon was conferred with an honorary Associates Degree in Business Administration from Rowan College Burlington County, in 2014. Harmon was awarded a honorary Doctor of Humane Letters (L.H.D.), honoris causa, from Fairleigh Dickinson University in May of 2022.

Harmon was bestowed with an honorary degree of Doctor of Business Administration.from Georgian Court University, Lakewood, NJ in May of 2024. Dr. Harmon, gave the undergraduate commencement address to the class of 2025, and was bestowed with an honorary doctor of humane letters degree, from William Paterson University at the Prudential Center, in Newark, NJ, in May of 2025.

Harmon grew up in a large, working-class family in Trenton, NJ. His father operated his own trucking business; his mother was a factory worker. In high school, Harmon studied auto mechanics and aspired to one day running his own business like his father. Harmon is an avid sports fan, as a young man he played on the local baseball team. Today he enjoys golfing. He has three sons, John Jr., Joshua, and Justin. He is a member of Higher Ground Interdenominational Church, in Ewing, NJ. Harmon released a book in 2025 - Power Moves: The Life and Legacy of a Black Chamber Executive.





ABOUT THIS BOOK

New Jersey native John E. Harmon Sr. has never been a stranger to hard work. At just 11 years old, he got his first job selling produce out of the back of his family's truck. While most kids would probably recoil at the thought of work, a young John was excited by it. He got a thrill out of discovering new ways to use the money he earned from one job to leverage it into his next opportunity. Entrepreneurship was in his bones. But like most entrepreneurs, his journey towards success was rocky, though it would deem itself worthy, in the end. After becoming the first person in his family to graduate from college, John set his sights on a safe career in the world of banking. However, after a short few years, his plan was knocked off course when the bank he worked for was sold.

Though he didn't immediately recognize it, the disturbance was a blessing in disguise. He found himself gravitating back toward a career that allowed him to be the captain of his own destiny. Now back within the world of entrepreneurship, his first endeavor would be a trucking company he founded with his older brother. While he displayed a natural propensity for the work he did, he quickly realized that being a Black business owner was no easy feat. He recognized the limited systems of support that existed for those that looked like him, which often left no one to turn to when the roads got rough. Instead of accepting this reality as his fate, he set out to level the playing field by building an ecosystem for Black businesses to thrive. In Power Moves, John recounts his journey of ascension, from humble beginnings as the fifth of seven children in a working class family in Trenton, New Jersey, to becoming one of the state's most influential businessmen.

With unflinching honesty, he tells the tale of the man behind the prestigious titles, awards, and revered accolades. Offering up lessons and experiences that define his inspirational journey, he recounts life-altering moments from his chaotic childhood, the challenges and joys of fatherhood, and, of course, the moment he accidentally stumbled upon his purpose. His candid account of navigating corporate America as a Black man, details the many difficulties he encountered while building several Black Chambers of Commerce within his home state, and those nearby.

As a devout husband, father, brother, CEO, founder, and chairman, Power Moves is the dynamic story of a man who conquered copious roles in stride. Through examples pulled straight from his awe-inspiring story, he shows us how to succeed in one aspect of life while simultaneously failing in another. His rousing story is one about learning to see a door slammed as an opportunity to find an open window nearby, to be resilient in the face of adversity, and to be strategic when confronted with unexpected obstacles. John's story forces readers to reimagine their definition of success, and to consider a life lived more purposefully. Copyedited 10.08.23 Why is this book relevant: According to the U.S. Census Bureau's 2021 Annual Business Survey, there are approximately 3.12 million Black-owned businesses across the country. However, data shows that despite an uptick in the number of Black folks entering the realm of entrepreneurship, they're still facing significantly more challenges than their non-Black counterparts.

An Intuit QuickBooks survey found that 57% of Black business owners were denied bank loans when starting their companies, versus a mere 37% of non-Black business owners. Additionally, Bank of America's 2022 Women and Minority Business Owner Spotlight found that 46% of respondents had trouble accessing capital. These are struggles that John knows all too well. As seen through his own lived experiences, John understands the challenges and rewards that come with running your own business, and from trying to build something from nothing. His story explores a wide range of themes that even non-entrepreneurs will relate to. As he navigates childhood trauma, love and parenthood, economics, racial inequities, and the challenges of entrepreneurship and leadership, readers are encouraged to see themselves in him.





JOHN E. HARMON'S FUTURE & DREAMS

Seventeen years ago, I had a vision to establish an organization that would work in partnership with the Governor, and his administration, corporate executives, and stakeholders across New Jersey to position black residents and black businesses for equitable participation in every sector of New Jersey's economy. The engagement of these critical partners has not changed. However, the widening disparities in access to opportunities within the public and private sector for blacks versus others must be addressed. Blacks remain at the bottom in a variety of areas, Economic opportunities, Employment, Homeownership, Net Worth, Health and decision-making roles in government and business. The level of acknowledgement and inaction is insulting. The call for statewide accountability is apparent.

Through our meetings with the Murphy Administration and elected officials we have shared best practices of public procurement policies from around the country as well as systems and processes that could improve the social and economic standing of the 1.2 million blacks and over 124,000 black owned businesses, and for others, if these proposed recommendations are adopted and implemented.

Once you have been informed it is time to respond. Black voters in New Jersey ushered Governor Murphy to victory in his first and second terms by providing 94 and 96 percent respectively of their vote. Additionally, black people as a voting block in New Jersey vote overwhelmingly for democrats at a rate of approximately above ninety percent.

Based on the level of investment of black people via their vote for democratic candidates, why are we still appealing for intentional effort to mitigate the underperformance of blacks in New Jersey's economy? The establishment of reciprocity benchmarks with equity is what the AACCNJ is advocating for.

The recent results of the 2024 presidential race between Vice President Harris and Former President Trump revealed that Former President Trump lost by only 4 percentage points in New Jersey, a state, where registered democratic voters are approximately 900,000 more than registered republicans. These numbers indicated to me that more than blacks are feeling their relationship with the democratic party is not equitable or reciprocal. We will continue to pursue greater equity and reciprocity from our elected officials as well as corporations in New Jersey.

The execution of our mission has been steadfastly focused and the impact of the AACCNJ continues to reverberate throughout New Jersey. We continue to make progress, however there are several policy barriers that limit the equitable participation of Black residents and Black businesses.

THE VISION:

- Raising the exemption threshold on Project Labor Agreements in New Jersey from \$5 Million to \$35 Million so that the limits align with Federal Law.
- The abolishment of Registered Municipal Accountant designation as a requirement to perform municipal government audits.
- Elimination of Education, Occupation and Credit Scoring as proxies for auto insurance premiums.

- Disaggregation of the spending levels of blacks and other groups; applying all the aspirational goals once adopted to every dollar the state of New Jersey spends, Pension funds, bond finance, professional services, Construction, and Good and Services, etc.


The time is long overdue for our state legislators and the governor to engage us to make our state more equitable for lacks. We are encouraged by the progress that we have made with corporations and financial services institutions in 2025 while seeking to build upon our mutual success in 2026.

Ironically, opportunities in New Jersey have always been plentiful, however, the challenge continues to be equitable participation for blacks; something that must change for New Jersey to realize its fullest potential.

However, for us to be successful in 2025 and beyond, we will need complete engagement from a variety of stakeholders. We ask that you give us an opportunity to serve and support your business.

John E. Harmon, Sr. IOM, is the former President and CEO of the Metropolitan Trenton African American Chamber of Commerce (MTAACC).



The Metropolitan Trenton African American Chamber of Commerce was a local organization of businesses and companies in Trenton with the intention to develop and further the interests of local companies and businesses in United States.

Chambers of Commerce main activities were safeguarding business interests and sharing business experiences and business interests, contact with governments, civil society, local media and the press and organzing trade shows and events.









NATIONAL BLACK CHAMBER OF COMMERCE FOUNDED 1993

The National Black Chamber of Commerce was establisted in 1993, based on the previously executed vision of Booker T. Washingtons National Negro Business League. The National Black Chamber of Commerce us a non-profit, non-partisan, non-sectarian organization dedicated to the economic empowerment of Black Communities. The NBCC acts as an advocate for the community, looking to bridge the gap of historical exclusion of Black Americans women, and other ethnic/racial minorities.

When Kay DeBow Alford and her husband Harry left Indianapolis, Indiana and moved to Washington, D.C. in September 1994, they had already founded the National Black Chamber of Commerce on May 23, 1993. They had begun locally to fill the void of a Black business organization by founding the Hoosier Minority Chamber of Commerce in Indianapolis which evolved into the NBCC.

The NBCC was crafted from the empowerment principles of Booker T. Washington, the business acumen of Congressman Parren Mitchell, and enforced by the father of affirmative Action Arthur Fletcher. Kay and Harry Alford took the business mission to new heights. The organization, comprised of chapters throughout the United States expanded its reach internationally to France, Mexico, England, Brazil, Costa Rica, Colombia, Kenya, and Ghana.

A REFLECTION FROM JOHN E. HARMON SR., IOM

"Let me start by saying thank you. As I reflect over the last ten years, I can recall the countless number of people who attempted to sway me from moving forward on the formation of the AACCNJ with their broken promises and lack of follow through. However, given the systemic challenges of high poverty, unemployment, limited skills development, and low capacity for the 1.2 million African American residents and over 66,000 businesses in New Jersey, there was a void that some group had to fulfill if New Jersey was to get on a path to improve its level of competitiveness.

In my opinion, the African American community and New Jersey's mainstream, where all of the resources, opportunities, and information are prevalent, were traveling on separate axes. Unless there is an intersection, the probability of fostering relations are minimal, thus creating the void which AACCNJ chose to bridge through its mission. Since then, we have been able to advance public policy through engagement of both republicans and democrats, while accomplishing similar goals with various chambers and business associates.

Moreover, our most rewarding advocacy has been our ability to engage traditional African American community organizations and faith-based leaders around the table talking candidly about the state of the African American community.

Although we pause to celebrate this historical milestone, there remains plenty of work to be done. We are encouraged to see the recent set aside procurement ordinances in Essex and Hudson counties and a coalescence of African American groups on a platform of economic and social justice issues, which, if implemented, would improve conditions for African Americans in New Jersey while strengthening our state. I am proud to lead an organization whose success of its mission has favorable implications for New Jersey. Lastly, I owe a debt of gratitude to the staff, board members, and to those who invested their time and treasure to help build the AACCNJ of today. Nelson Mandela said, "It always seems impossible, until it is done."



In order to impact the black business community in a significant way, you had to have real credible strategic relationships, wherein we could leverage resources opportunities and information. that was the impetus for the creation of the AACCNJ".

The New Jersey Disparity Study results, released January 2024, revealed that Black-owned businesses received **1%** or less of state contracts in all industries between fiscal years **2015-2020**. For construction, Black-owned businesses received approximately **\$3.3 million** compared to White-male-owned businesses **\$10.8 billion**. Further, Black-owned businesses received **\$13.7 million** for professional services, compared to White-male-owned businesses **\$3.4 billion**. In response, AACCNJ formed the Disparity Study Task Force Committee to identify real solutions for the Murphy Administration to put in place to address the inequalities in business opportunity and prosperity in the state of New Jersey.







The Socioeconomic Standing of Blacks In NJ and Public Policy

New Jersey is home to 1.2 million blacks and over 124,000 black owned businesses. Blacks voted 94 and 96 percent respectively for the Murphy Administration in their two terms in office. Blacks have the highest poverty and unemployment; their net worth is \$17,000 vs \$322,000 for whites. Homeownership for blacks is 40 percent vs 70 percent for whites.

Legislative/policy issues that would make a significant impact on economic opportunities and disposable income for blacks if they were modified or abolished in New Jersey.

- Insurance companies in New Jersey, except for CURE Auto Insurance, use Education, Occupation and Credit Scores as proxies to determine auto insurance premiums.
- Most accountants use GAAP- Generally Accepted Accounting Principles to confirm financial soundness of businesses. However, there is a law which allows CPAs with a Registered Municipal Accountants (RMA) designation exclusively to audit the financial conditions of municipalities in New Jersey. There are approximately 20,500 CPAs and only 135 CPAs with an RMA. This law excludes many CPAs from performing audits within their communities notwithstanding experience and capacity.

45:2B-70. Requirements for qualifications as a registered municipal accountant

29. A certified public accountant or public accountant holding an active license shall qualify as a registered municipal accountant by passing a registered municipal accountant's examination. Only a registered municipal accountant licensed in this State shall undertake the work of auditing the financial statements of any municipality or county.

The board shall make all the rules governing examinations and the issuance of licenses to registered municipal accountants. The registration fee for a registered municipal accountant of New Jersey shall be established by the board and shall be imposed for each triennial registration.

• Governor James McGreevey established the Project Labor Agreements (PLA) in 2002 as his first Executive Order at a threshold of \$5 Million Dollars. Subsequently, Presidents Obama and Biden had PLA thresholds of \$25 Million and \$35 Million respectfully. We would like to have the threshold levels in New Jersey raised to align with the federal government. This change would allow more businesses to compete for taxpayer funded projects thus potentially impacting the 93 percent sole proprietorship rate of black businesses in New Jersey.

Statewide Disparity Study

A few highlights from the New Jersey Disparity Study results revealed that Black-owned businesses received ~1% (or less) of state contracts in all industries between fiscal years 2015-2020:

Black-owned businesses received 13, or 0.43% of all formal construction prime contracts awarded during the study period, representing \$3,302,674 or 0.03% of the construction prime contract dollars (as compared to \$10.8 billion awarded to White-male-owned businesses).

Black-owned businesses received 65, or 1.15% of all formal professional services prime contracts awarded during the study period, representing \$13,736,729 or 0.34% of the professional services prime contract dollars (as compared to \$3.4 billion awarded to White-male-owned businesses); and

Black-owned businesses received 62, or 0.53% of all formal goods and services prime contracts awarded during the study period, representing \$12,227,367 or 0.38% of the goods and services prime contract dollars (as compared to \$2.9 billion awarded to White-male-owned businesses).

These statistics are disheartening in light of New Jersey's diverse population and the number of qualified/available MWBEs in the State:

- o Black-owned businesses represent 9.19% of the available construction businesses and received 0.14% of the dollars on construction contracts valued over \$65,000 to \$5,710,000.
- o Black-owned businesses represent 12.01% of the available professional services businesses and received 1.44% of the dollars on professional services contracts valued over \$40,000 to \$800,000.
- o Black-owned businesses represent 10.08% of the available goods and services businesses and received 0.46% of the dollars on goods and services contracts valued over \$40,000 to \$360,000.
- o Black-owned businesses represent 5.97% of the available prime contractors for informal contracts and received 0.75% of the dollars on informal prime contracts for all industries.

The underutilization in each of these categories is statistically significant.





Uncle John
