REFLECTIONS:... from Father Daniel

I suppose that forgiving is the hardest thing we are asked to do. What do we do when someone wrongs us? A cruel teacher. An unfriendly parent. An unfaithful spouse. An unreasonable boss. We experience actual hurt and there is a wound left in our souls. What can be done? How do we respond? Writing to the Romans, St. Paul reminds us that the greatest commandment is to love our neighbors as ourselves. Our response should come out of love. The response outlined in today's Gospel is different from our usual response. Our response of being wronged is often enough to complain to someone else about our hurt feelings(anger, or whatever). The response calls for a certain amount of courage and is motivated by love.

The first reading also touches on the responsibility we have to correct our brothers and sisters or we will be held accountable. Just as Jesus instructs his followers how to help each other stay on the right track. It is not a responsibility to be taken lightly. Because what is at stake is important- the health of the individual and of the community.

What if someone does not respond? The Gospel outlines the steps to take, and the final resort is to treat the person as a Gentile or tax collector/ To the first Christians, coming from Jewish origins, Gentiles and tax collectors were outcasts. But if we look once again to St. Paul's letter, we find that they too should be treated with love. Love does not mean accepting everything a person does. It does mean accepting the person. Recall the last time someone hurt you. What happened? Have you forgiven the person?Pray for him or her. Remember holding onto anger has been likened to taking a sip of poison everyday, not enough to kill, but more than enough to debilitate.Pope Francis said, "It's bad walking alone:it's bad and boring. Walking in community, with

friends, with those who love us, that helps us. It helps us to arrive precisely at that goal that 'there where' we're supposed to arrive." St. Therese of the child Jesus, who entered the Carmelite monastery at the age of 15 said, "I have found a vocation and my vocation is love."
