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


Coal Creek | Bryan Tapp

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Naturalist's Notebook: Argiope aurantia

Argiope rhymes with calliope (accent on the second syllable). You are familiar with her; she's the common large black and yellow garden spider with the exquisite orb web. I have been watching one near the fallen bee tree on Green Dragon Trail for three weeks. She had built her web a few feet from the opening of the bees' nest, apparently right in one of their return flight paths. One of our visitors said, "How clever of her to build her web in that location!"

The first time I saw her she drew my attention away from the bees by shaking her web while in the process of packaging one of the returning workers. She was smack dab in the middle of the web and had already captured two other bees. I noticed the web was large and beautiful with a strong zigzag middle. On another occasion I observed one fortunate bee bounce the web, struggle to back away, fly to the right, and escape back to the hole in the tree. Six other bees had not been so fortunate. I could see five bodies encased in the spider's silk, each spread several centimeters away from the center of the web as the spider wrapped up the sixth, again in the middle of the web. When I returned last Sunday, she was gone, so was her cache of bees, and the web looked unkempt. Those are my observations so far.

When I told Mary what I had seen and wondered about, she responded that her Junior Naturalists had seen the same spider and came up with similar questions. I had intended to tell you what the questions were, but I think not. Instead, as I would ask any interested young naturalist (aren't we all young naturalists when we are at Oxley?), what are your questions? Feel free to speculate on the answers too. And, if you'd like, share your thoughts with us. We can all be inspired to wonder by a spider.
