# A little about the North American River Otter (Lontra canadensis)

River otters like to live in areas which offer constant water which has fish and crustaceans, both of which Oxley Nature Center's streams abundantly offer. One reason we are pleased to see these mustelids here is that their presence indicates good water quality. Once otters were abundant in North America, however, they were over-hunted and their habitats spoiled due to certain agricultural practices. In 1984-85 the Department of Wildlife Conservation reintroduced them and they became reestablished in eastern Oklahoma. The group of otters in this photo could be a female and her young, a group of males, or several mothers and their juveniles. River otters like to make dens in abandoned beaver lodges. Interestingly, this group was spotted directly opposite a large but occupied beaver lodge!
