Dear Parents and Carers.

At Arbor schools, we promote a culture of vigilance by constantly teaching and reminding our children how to keep themselves safe. We teach them to speak out and tell them what to do if they come across a situation that makes them feel unsafe.

We regularly hold assemblies that teach our children about the different aspects of safeguarding, how to recognise inappropriate behaviour and what to do and who they can talk to if they are worried about something that is happening to them.

Safeguarding children is the action we take to promote the welfare of children and protect them from harm. Safeguarding is everyone's responsibility. Every single person who comes into contact with children and families has a role to play. You will see at the top of this page, information about who to speak to if you have any concerns about a child's safety and welfare, however all of our staff are trained on safeguarding if you want to discuss any concerns with them. There is further information within this newsletter on how you can keep your child safe.

Keeping Children Safe in Education (2025) is statutory guidance setting out the statutory duties all schools and colleges must follow with regards to the care of children in their schools and colleges. This document sets out its legal duties that all schools and colleges must comply with. Some of the different area of this document include:

- Physical, emotional, sexual and abuse and neglect
- Female genital mutilation
- Prevent strategy
- Online safety
- Child sexual exploitation
- · Peer on peer abuse

## **Online Safety Information for Parents/Carers**

Online safety is an important part of keeping children safe. All of our pupils are taught how to be safe and behave appropriately online, but we can only be successful in keeping children safe online if we work together.
