Doors will open one hour prior to the performances.



COUNCIL MINUTES — WAYNE WOSJE

October 19, 2025

Present: Jon Cisar, Carla Middlen, Danielle Champa, Gwen Oakland, Todd Brower, Brian Ensberg, Pastor Layne Nelson,

Vice President Cisar called the meeting to order at 11:25 am.

Motion to approve Agenda as presented by Carla Middlen, seconded by Gwen Oakland, Motion carried.

Pastor Nelson gave devotions on the reformation followed by Luther's Morning Prayer.

<u>Secretaries Report</u>: Motion was made by Brian Ensberg, seconded by Gwen Oakland to approve the minutes from the September 14 meeting as presented, Motion Carried.

<u>Vice President's Report</u>: Vice President Cisar reported that it's a very busy time of year with everything that is going on.

<u>Pastors' Reports</u>: Pastor Nelson reported that we've had quite a few funerals and weddings. New members were received Oct 8th and 9th. Hiking event was attended by 12 people and was well received. "Beer and Theology" will be at 7:00 pm on the last Tuesday of each month at Monks. Confirmation Sunday is October 26th. Consecration Sunday is November 9th. Ninth grade Faith Statements have been takin place in worship and are well received by the congregation.

<u>Financial Report</u>: Brian Ensberg, Treasurer, and Wayne Wosje, Business Manager, presented the following financial report: Year to date through September our total net is (\$48,063) which is \$3,385 better than the budget. Offerings are up \$36,791, which is a 9.74% increase over last year. Rummage Sale proceeds of \$22,591 are now in the money market account. The balance of that account is \$84,745. The Finance Committee met on September 18. Discussion topics included the endowment fund, the switching of the capital money market account to Wells Fargo for a higher interest rate, and a possible 2026 campaign to pay off the mortgage. Mortgage balance is \$624,993. In late September we were victims of check fraud. One of our checks was intercepted in the mail and the person made duplicates and cashed five checks, was stopped on the sixth attempt. Police report was filed. Bank was contacted and processes are in place to prevent this from happening in the future. Carla Middlen moved; Gwen Oakland seconded to approve the Treasurers report, Motion carried

Committee/Taskforce reports:

Stewardship - Jon Cisar reported bulletin inserts will be handed out the next three weeks. Also, there will be Temple Talks the next three weeks at the beginning of the services. The cover letter has been finalized and will be mailed out. The brochures have been finalized and will go out with letter number 2. Pledge cards will be collected on Consecration Sunday, November 9th. Annual Thanks for Giving meal will be November 23rd at 11:15 am.

<u>Property</u> - Todd Brower reported Landscape Sprinkler has been secured for snow removal with minor increases in pricing. The new furnace is up and running with a new thermostat for the sanctuary. Our boiler was dinged with two violations on inspection. They are both being worked on. New ice machine has been installed. Thank you to Laird Raschke for doing that. Discussion of things that need to be done: New carpet in many areas, new flooring in the kitchen, stoves.

<u>New Business</u>: Select Planning Committee: November 15th Council Retreat to look at committee and staffing structure. Carla will work with Layne on an agenda for the retreat. TREASURER'S REPORT — BRIAN ENSBERG



Our church finance committee met on September 18, 2025. Representatives from Wells Fargo reviewed our endowment fund that has a balance of \$858,815. This November we will take a \$30,000 distribution as planned. The committee also discussed the switching of the capital money market account to a higher interest account and discussed a possible future campaign to pay off our mortgage balance of \$624,993.

Year-to-date as of September 30, 2025, our financial position is a deficit (48,063) which is \$3,385 better than budget. Offerings are up \$36,791, which is up 9.74% over last year. Thank you for your continued support of our church mission.

The St. Arbucks rummage sale proceeds of \$22,591 have been placed in our capital money market account to fund capital projects and other initiatives. This annual event has become a critical event in the financial life of our church! The total capital money market balance is \$84,745.

The complete year-to-date budget is posted on the church bulletin board.

VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT - RANDY KOLDEN



While many wear different hats Randy Kolden wears many different robes/aprons. From Choir Robe to Lefse Apron to Dishwashing Apron you will find Randy Kolden busy volunteering around East Side Lutheran Church.

Randy grew up as an only child on a farm in Clark County with his Dad Arlo and Mom Dollie. His Grandparents were of Scandinavian Heritage. After graduating high school Randy attended Augustana College with a double major in Criminal Justice and Sociology. He worked as a police man, with the Child Support Office and at Hutchinson Technology. Working with people has always been important to Randy.

Randy has been a member of the ESL Choir for many years and enjoys singing. He has also been part of the Barber Shop Quartet for the past 20 years. The Quartet performs at many different venues and events. They have also been known to be singing-grams for birthdays, anniversaries and Valentines Day.

Growing up in a Scandinavian home there was plenty of home made lefse, sweat soup, Rommegrot, Krumkake, Rosettes and the list goes on and on. Randy learned how to make Lefse from his Mom Dollie. Eight years ago when he started making Lefse he shared some with Pastor Olaf and a few other members at ESL and that was the beginning of what is known as Randy's Lefse. It takes about 2 hours to make one batch of Lefse which equals 18 rounds. Randy estimates he makes 2500 to 3000 rounds of Lefse each year. Doing the math that is 166 batches of Lefse and around 333 hours in the kitchen. When I asked why he makes so much Lefse he stated "I love to see people smile". Three rounds of Lefse sell for \$5 and

the proceeds are a fundraiser for ESL. Randy's Lefse also gets shipped out for orders from as far as Alaska, Florida, California and Arizona. Many people love Lefse but they do not have a grandma or mother to teach them so Randy has been asked by many groups to hold classes. Most recently he was asked to have a class for the Daughters of Norway. If you are interested in learning he has a U-Tube channel "Randy Making Lefse" where he not only shares the recipe but also tricks to making Lefse.



He trades in his Lefse apron for the Dishwashing apron whenever there is a need in the kitchen at East Side. From funeral, confirmation dinner or any event that dishes need to be washed you can find Randy at the dishwasher.

Randy is on the board for Food To You which is housed at East Side Lutheran. He volunteers each week picking up food for the distribution, setting up for the evening, serving those who are in need and cleaning up after the distribution.

Randy does all this because he loves to see people smile. Thank you Randy for all the smiles you put on many faces. God Bless You and the work that you do.
