Statement from BLI President Fr. Emmanuel Katongole

Dear Bethany Land Institute Family & Friends,

Marking the 10th anniversary of <u>Laudato Si': On the Care of our Common Home</u>, the Laudato Si' Africa conference welcomed an international cohort of practitioners, educators, and leaders to BLI's campus in Luweero, Uganda in July, 2025. While there were many gifts from the conference, I would like to highlight three:

First, the gift of hope. While the cry of the earth and the cry of the poor continues to be heard across Africa, the stories of those who have championed the spirit of Laudato Si' confirmed that "not all is lost" (Laudato Si' 205). I was particularly encouraged by the action of young scholars, activists, and organizers.



What is Laudato Si'?

In 2015, the Late Pope Francis published his Encyclical Letter titled "Laudato Si': On Care for our Common Home." In this historical document, Pope Francis calls for the action of all people against mindsets and lifestyles of environmental exploitation. As God's interconnected creations, Laudato Si' reminds readers that the flourishing of people and the flourishing of our common home are deeply intertwined. "[W]e come together to take charge of this home which has been entrusted to us," he writes, "May our struggles and our concern for this planet never take away the joy of our hope" (Laudato Si' 244).

Around the world, diverse movements have answered the call for the care of our common home. At the Laudato Si' Africa Conference, the people behind these movements came together to cultivate their knowledge and identify the necessary work to come.



"Saint Francis of Assisi reminds us that our common home is like a sister with whom we share our life...

This sister now cries out to us because of the harm we have inflicted on her by our irresponsible use and abuse of the goods with which God has endowed her. We have come to see ourselves as her lords and masters, entitled to plunder her at will. The violence present in our hearts, wounded by sin, is also reflected in the symptoms of sickness evident in the soil, in the water, in the air and in all forms of life. This is why the earth herself, burdened and laid waste, is among the most abandoned and maltreated of our poor; she "groans in travail" (Rom 8:22). We have forgotten that we ourselves are dust of the earth (cf. Gen 2:7); our very bodies are made up of her elements, we breathe her air and we receive life and refreshment from her waters.

What is Integral Ecology?

Integral Ecology recognizes the interconnectedness of all creation. A significant innovation to ecology studies and practices, Integral Ecology emphasizes the deep interrelation between the environment and the human systems that impact the environment, including economic, political, social, faith, and cultural structures. For practitioners of Integral Ecology, the call for the care of our common home can only fully be answered through the fostering of peace and justice in all facets of the human and environmental experience. "We are faced not with two separate crises, one environmental and the other social, but rather with one complex crisis which is both social and environmental," Pope Francis explains (Laudato Si' 139).

BLI employs the notion and practice of Integral Ecology to empower local students and communities to combat three major challenges in Uganda: environmental degradation, food insecurity, and poverty. We recognize the inherent connection between the cry of the Earth and the cry of the poor, and the importance of education, environmentalism, and sound economics.

"When we speak of the 'environment', what we really mean is a relationship existing between nature and the society which lives in it. Nature cannot be regarded as something separate from ourselves or as a mere setting in which we live. We are part of nature, included in it and thus in constant interaction with it...Strategies for a solution demand an integrated approach to combating poverty, restoring dignity to the excluded, and at the same time protecting nature."

The Panels: Facilitating Palaver

Palaver: Deep listening through community conversation.

Embodying the African cultural *Palaver*, the Laudato Si' Conference organizers sought to facilitate **rich community dialogue and conversation** about matters essential to the fabric of our world. Facilitated by our Master of Ceremonies extraordinaire **Fr. Arthur Ssembajja**, attendees and panelists touched the core of issues of environmental degredation, sustainability, and thriving livelihoods.

Each panel was guided by a series of **questions** from moderators and the audience exploring tangible innovations for environmental challenges. Understanding that the future is in the hands of **humanity's collaboration**, we sought to create a space in which no one was talked at, but instead **spoken with**.

The Panels: Facilitating Palaver

Day 1 explored "The Cry of the Earth & the Cry of the Poor," including challenges of extractivism, ecological violence, and the disproportionate burdens of marginalized communities.





Day 2 centered "Ethics and Spirituality of Integral Ecology," exploring issues at the intersection of ecology, nonviolence, peacebuilding, theology, and ethics.

Day 3 framed "Lines of Action and Sources of Hope," inspired by youth mobilization, sustainable development initiatives, ecological innovations, and diverse grassroots movements.

What is **Bethany Land Institute?**

Uganda has the 4th fastest growing population on Earth. This growing population, coupled with inadequate ecological protections, has led to rapid deforestation. The lack of viable economic opportunities in rural Africa magnifies this environmental degradation, as youth are forced to engage in unsustainable livelihoods. Having emerged as a result of human activities, including Uganda's devastating Civil War (1980-1986), there is hope that through *changed* human activities, this environmental devastation can be transformed.

In 2012, Fr. Emmanuel Katongole, Fr. Cornelius Ssempala, and the late Fr. Anthony Rweza- having experienced the challenges of life in rural Uganda and having been inspired by Laudato Si'- realized that the major problems of deforestation, food insecurity, and poverty in Africa are interconnected. Addressing them thus requires "an education program" to cultivate a "distinctive way of looking at things, a way of thinking ...a lifestyle and a spirituality" (Laudato Si' 111). Putting their inspiration into action, our beloved founders forged critical relationships with the diocese of Kasana Luweero and Archbishop Paul Ssemogerere to establish Bethany Land Institute in Luweero, Uganda.

What Next?: **BLI Called Higher**


The overwhelming success of the Laudato Si' Africa Conference has called Bethany Land Institute to new heights. As the world reckons with the demands of the call for the care of our common home, **BLI is prepared to serve as a champion for the education and practice of Integral Ecology**. We are thankful for this diverse growth in the BLI network, and all of the work that made it happen.

All presentations and papers will be compiled into an **academic volume to be published by Springer Nature in 2026**, managed by faculty at the Keough School for Global Affairs, University of Notre Dame.

Continued development and expansion of the Integral Ecology Working Group, under the Sowing Hope Project at Notre Dame, is underway. This working group will serve as a crucial hub for ongoing collaboration, research, and praxis inspired by the conference. BLI will remain at the center of this movement - as a site for formation, as a laboratory for learning, and as a wellspring of inspiration.

BLI Strategic Goals:

- 1. Increase the number of Caretaker trainees per class to 32 by 2027, ensuring such trainees come from various villages across Uganda.
- 2. Produce at least **70% of all food consumed** at BLI on our own land by 2029.
- 3. Open an official Lazarus' Forest information center for visitors and researchers by 2027, equipped with classrooms and accommodations.
- 4. Ensure ongoing partnerships with at least 20 community groups and 36 schools by 2029.
- 5. Plant 1,000,000 trees by 2050.
